Consultations between Sec. Gen. and members of the
Government of Jordan (Note to correspondents)

Following consultations between Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold and members of the Government of Jordan, the following joint communique was issued today in Amman:

"In accordance with the resolution adopted by the United Nations General Assembly on 21 August 1958, the Secretary-General has, during the last three days, consulted with His Majesty the King, the Prime Minister and other representatives of the Jordan Government regarding such 'practical arrangements' as were envisaged by the General Assembly for the purposes mentioned in the resolution. The consultations, which have indicated a large area of agreement between the Government and the Secretary-General as regards such arrangements, have now been brought to a temporary conclusion. They will be resumed and concluded at a renewed visit which the Secretary-General intends to make to Amman after having consulted also with other Governments concerned in the area.

The policy of the Government of Jordan as represented in the debate at the Emergency Special Session of the General Assembly by the representative of Jordan is that neither a United Nations Force, nor a border observation group, would adequately serve the purposes which the General Assembly had in mind. This view is shared by the Secretary-General. The consultations have, therefore, been concerned with other forms of United Nations presence, both sides having been guided by the wish to see such a presence developed in a form which would support the policies of cooperation and mutual respect to which all Arab states, in co-sponsoring the resolution, pledged themselves. It is felt that by working in that direction, the United Nations would most adequately further all the purposes of the resolution."
