DOMINICAN REPUBLIC RATIFIES PACT ON POLITICAL RIGHTS OF WOMEN

UN 42158 - UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., 11 December 1953 -

The Dominican Republic today became the first country to ratify the United Nations Convention on the Political Rights of Woman, a pact adopted by the General Assembly in December 1952 and which will come into force after six ratifications or accessions. The convention had previously been signed by 32 countries.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC IS FIRST COUNTRY TO RATIFY THE
U.N. CONVENTION ON THE POLITICAL RIGHTS OF WOMEN

IN 42116 -- UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., 11 Dec. 1953 --

The Dominican Republic today became the first country to ratify the U.N. Convention on the Political Rights of Women, a pact adopted by the General Assembly in December 1952. Previously this Convention, which entitles women to vote in all elections on equal terms with men and stipulates that they are eligible for election to public office without discrimination, has been signed by 32 countries. It will come into force after six ratifications or accessions.

Here, Dr. Tulio FRANCO y FRANCO (left), Permanent Representative of the Dominican Republic to the U.N., and Miss Minerva BERNARDINO, Alternate Representative, present the instrument of ratification to Mr. Dag HAMMARSKJÖLD, Secretary--General of the United Nations.

Miss Bernardino is the Chairman of the Commission on the Status of Women, the body which originally drafted the Convention.
