In response to questions concerning the United States attitude toward the United Nations Security Council Subcommittee Report, the United States Delegation spokesman read the following statement issued by the State Department:

We believe the Report of the United Nations Security Council Subcommittee on its recent inquiry into the threat to the independence and security of Laos will enable the Security Council to better understand the danger that confronts Laos. Anyone who reads the report and examines the evidence submitted will agree with the Subcommittee's members that ". . . it would appear that various degrees and kinds of support have been accorded to these hostile elements from sources on the North Vietnamese side of the border."

With reference to the "hostile elements", the Report states:

"Practically all witnesses (40 out of 41) stated that the hostile elements received support from the territory of the DRVN consisting mainly of equipment, arms, ammunition, supplies and the help of political cadres. The same emerges from the official Laotian documents submitted and from some of the material exhibits."

As we have said before, the United States Government believes the United Nations Subcommittee has had a tranquilizing effect on the dangerous situation there. This is evident by the fact that the aggressive actions of the

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attacking forces were immediately reduced upon the Subcommittee's arrival in Laos.

In the light of this evidence we are considering what further steps might be taken in the United Nations to help the Laotian people to maintain their independence and security.

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In response to a request for comment on the last sentence of Paragraph 98 of the Summary which said, "The ensemble of information submitted to the Subcommittee did not clearly establish whether there were crossings of the frontier by regular troops of the DRVN", the United States Delegation spokesman stated:

From the observation of the Subcommittee in its report on the nature of the attack and of the terrain in which these attacks were waged, one would not expect that any regular DRVN army unit that may or may not have been participating would be easily or clearly identified. This does not preclude such participation but points out the difficulty of identification. However, in this connection, I refer you to the testimony of eye witnesses who identified soldiers of the attacking forces as coming from North Vietnam by the color of their uniforms, by their language and by other identifiable characteristics.
