NEW REPRESENTATIVE OF YUGOSLAVIA PRESENTS CREDENTIALS

UN 43194 - UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., 20 May 1954 -

Dr. Joza BRILEJ (right) presenting to Secretary-General Dag HAMMARSKJÖLD (left) his credentials as Permanent Representative of the Federal People's Republic of Yugoslavia to the United Nations, a post in which he replaces Mr. Leo Mates, who is now Yugoslav Ambassador to the United States. The brief ceremony took place this morning at U.N. headquarters.

Ambassador Brilej was born on 1 January 1910 and educated at the University of Ljubljana. He practiced law until the beginning of World War II, and he took part in Yugoslavia's War of Liberation from 1941 to 1945, with the rank of Colonel. From 1945 to 49, he was Director of the Political Department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and in 1949 he was named Assistant Foreign Minister. From 1950 to 53, he was Ambassador to Great Britain, and since that time he has been Counsellor of State for Foreign Affairs. He was appointed Permanent Representative to the U.N. on 27 April 1954.
