DAG HAMMARSKJÖLD, SECRETARY-GENERAL OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Mr. Dag HAMMARSKJÖLD, new Secretary-General of the United Nations. Mr. Hammarskjöld, who was born on 29 July 1905, in Jonkoping, Sweden, has already had experience of work with the U.N. He served as Vice-Chairman of the Swedish delegation to the General Assembly's 1951 session, in Paris, and as Chairman of his country's delegation to the Assembly's current session, during the first part of which he was in New York. Mr. Hammarskjöld holds degrees in Law and Political Economy from the University of Uppsala, in Sweden. In 1933, he was Assistant Professor in Political Economy at the University of Stockholm. He also has a notable career in the field of finance. From 1936 to 1945, he was Secretary-General of the Swedish Government's Department of Finance. In 1946, he held the position of Specialist in Finance in the Swedish Foreign Ministry, with the rank of Envoy. He has also served as Chairman of the Board of the National Bank of Sweden and as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Organization for European Economic Cooperation. He became his country's Minister of State in 1950.

FIRST AVENUE VEHICULAR TUNNEL OFFICIALLY OPENED

UN 40280 - UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., 20 April 1953 -

The First Avenue vehicular tunnel, running from 41st to 48th Streets, and the U.N. children's playground located at the north of the U.N. site area, were officially opened this morning in two brief ceremonies. The first ceremony, officially opening the tunnel, got under way at 11:40 a.m. before an estimated 600 people. It was presided over by Mr. Robert Wagner, Borough President of Manhattan, and included speeches by MM. Robert Moses, New York City Construction Coordinator, Mayor Vincent Impellitteri of New York, David Rockefeller, Vice-President of the Carnegie Endowment for Peace, former Secretary-General Trygve Lie and Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld.
