The subject of community development is receiving increasing attention from the governmental authorities and public leaders generally in the area to be visited. Headquarters is aware of this development which is reflected in United Nations programmes both in the field as well as in training courses, seminars and study tours. The economic aspects of community development are being studied through special projects being undertaken by ECAFE.

Greece:

The national correspondents in the field of social welfare are: Mr. Jean Kyriakos, Secretary-General, Ministry of Social Welfare, Athens; and Mr. André Psaras, Director-General, Ministry of Social Welfare, Athens.

The national correspondents in the field of social defence <sup>1/</sup>are: M. Constantin Gardikas, Professeur de Criminologie à l'Université, 6, rue Othon, Athènes; M. Ch. Triantaphyllidis, Directeur général près la Direction générale de la justice criminelle, Ministère de la Justice, Athènes; M. Dimitrios Caranicas, Professeur de Criminologie à l'Université de Thessalonique, Thessalonique.

Greece, Israel and Yugoslavia were visited during the summer of 1955 by a study tour on community development.

Turkey:

The national correspondent in the field of social welfare is: Mr. Yavuz Abadan, Professeur de droit public et Doyen de la Faculté des sciences politiques de l'Université d'Ankara, Ankara.

Although Turkey is nominally a member of the European regional consultative group on the prevention of crime and the treatment of offenders, and as such has been invited to participate, it has not attended any of the meetings of the group. It would be helpful if the Government were to be urged to participate in the European group, which will meet in Geneva in August, 1956.

As a follow up of the survey mission in the social defence field by Mr. Paul Amor in 1953 (Le Traitement des Délinquants en Turquie, TAA/NS/TUR/1) the Government has indicated a desire for further technical assistance in this field. It is intended that Mr. Paul Berthoud (see Lebanon) will be able to render this assistance on a short term basis during the current year.

At present a team of Turkish officials in the social defence field is observing practice in the Netherlands under a group fellowship.

Establishment of a School of Architecture and Community Planning in Ankara: After a survey of the housing and planning problem and consultations with the Prime Minister and the Minister of Education, a United Nations expert, Mr. Charles Abrams (at the time Rent Commissioner of the State of New York), recommended that the most effective attack upon these problems would be the establishment of a training institution for housing and planning personnel. Detailed plans for such a school and for the required international assistance were subsequently worked out by a special United Nations Mission (Dean Perkins, University of Pennsylvania and two others).

The United Nations and the United States International Cooperation Administration agreed to assist the Government in the implementation. The former head of the ICA, Mr. Stassen, favoured a three-year contract with the University of Pennsylvania at the rate of \$80,000 a year. After Mr. Hallister became head of the agency, it was reduced to one year. While the United Nations assistance (one professor and six fellowships for future teachers) is being provided, the ICA has since cancelled the contract.

The Government is now trying to go ahead with the establishment within the budgetary limitations of United Nations assistance made available to them.

United Nations Assistance in the Establishment of a National Housing Agency: Housing activities are at present scattered among numerous agencies and the country needs a national housing programme within the framework of economic development. In line with the recommendations of the United Nations expert, Mr. Charles Abrams, the Government now wants to establish a central agency and has made a request for four United Nations experts.

Egypt:

The Government of Egypt was the host country for the highly successful Middle Eastern regional Seminar on the prevention of crime and the treatment of offenders which took place in Cairo in December 1953 (ST/TAA/SER.C/17).

Israel:

The national correspondent in the field of social welfare is: Dr. Giora G. Lotan, Director, Social Insurance Division, Ministry of Labour, Jerusalem.

The national correspondents in the field of social defence are: Dr. Shimon Kelly, Medical Adviser to the Ministry of Justice, Jerusalem; Dr. Zvi Hermon, Commissioner of Prisons, Ministry of Police, Jerusalem.

Mr. Paul Berthoud of the Headquarters staff is in Beirut under Technical Assistance Administration auspices to advise the Lebanese Government on programmes in the field of social defence; he is available for short term assignments in other countries of the region.

At present, discussions are taking place with officials of the Syrian Government concerning that country's being host to the second Middle Eastern Regional Seminar in the field of the prevention of crime and the treatment of offenders, tentatively scheduled for the latter part of 1956.

At present, negotiations are underway with the Government of India concerning a regional institute in the field of the prevention of crime and the treatment of offenders for which India has indicated an interest to be host. A copy of the brief on this subject was given to Mr. de Seynes for his guidance.

Discussions are under way as to the establishment of a Far Eastern Demographic Research and Training Centre in India; Ceylon and Singapore are other possible locations.

BURMA:

The national correspondents in the field of social defence are: The Honourable Justice THAUNG SEIN, Judge of the High Court of Burma, Rangoon; Mr. BA THEIN, Inspector General of Prisons, No. 182, Strand Road, Rangoon; Sithu U BA MAUNG (5), Inspector General of Police, Rangoon.

The Government of Burma was host to the Asia and Far Eastern Seminar on the prevention of crime and the treatment of offenders which took place in Rangoon from 25 October to 6 November 1954 (ST/TAA/SER.C/22). The success of the Seminar was largely due to the excellent co-operation of the Government.

THAILAND:

Miss Evelyn Rauch is regional social welfare adviser for Asia and the Far East with headquarters at Bangkok.

Mr. Antoni Wojcicki is stationed at Bangkok as Social Affairs Officer for Community Development for Asia and the Far East. He is presently with a community development study tour visiting India and Pakistan; the tour has already visited Burma and Ceylon.

The Government of Thailand has not yet appointed national correspondents in the social defence field and might be urged to do so.

Mr. Edward Galway of the Headquarters Staff will be detached in the near future for duty in Asia and the Far East in the social defence field. He is expected to arrive in the region in May and will be attached to ECAFE, with Headquarters in Bangkok.

A request has been received from the Government of Thailand for a general social welfare adviser. We have had some question with respect to the request, particularly as regards the relationship with the United States experts presently in the country and presumably advising on social welfare questions. Miss Rauch is dealing with this matter.

INDONESIA:

Indonesia has not yet appointed national correspondents in the social defence field and it would be advisable for the country to do so.

Dr. Kurt Horstmann is assisting the Government in the demographic field.

NOTT, Comptroller General of Prisons, Prison Department, Sydney, New South Wales; Mr.A. MacKILLOP, Comptroller General of Prisons, Perth, WESTERN AUSTRALIA; Mr. J.H. ALLEN, Sheriff and Comptroller of Prisons, Supreme Court Building, King William Street, Adelaide, SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

The Government of Australia has not yet identified itself with one of the regional consultative groups, as provided for under resolution 415(V). The most suitable group, from the point of view of cultural affinities, is the European group and it would be helpful for the Government to be urged to indicate its desire to be identified with this group.

NEW ZEALAND:

The national correspondent in the field of social defence is : Mr. S.T. BARNETT, Secretary of Justice, New Zealand Department of Justice, Wellington.

As in the case of Australia, New Zealand has not yet indicated to which regional consultative group it wishes to belong; similarly, it would be best identified with the European group.

Hotel arrangements for Secretary-General and party

5. Honolulu - Reservations have been made at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel for the Secretary-General and Mr. Ranallo for the nights of 21 and 22 February, Tuesday and Wednesday.

NOTES FOR SECRETARY-GENERAL'S MIDDLE EAST TOUR

Iran

For many years the narcotics control bodies have been dissatisfied with the situation in Iran, but have received evasive answers in response to their numerous inquiries. In particular, the Iranian Government reported opium production as running about 100-120 tons a year. In August 1955, however, Dr. Saleh, the reformist Minister of Health, made dramatic public statements - and later confirmed them to the control bodies - to the effect that:

- "(i) the area under opium-poppy cultivation was 1/350th of the arable land of the country;
- (ii) the total opium harvest varied between 700 and 1,200 tons annually, and exports during the last ten years had averaged 90 tons annually;
- (iii) there were 1,500,000 opium addicts in Iran; about 2,000 kg of opium was smoked daily; and every year addiction to this drug caused 5,000 suicides, the premature death of about 100,000 people and the abandonment to destitution of something like 50,000 children."

It also follows, though the Minister of Public Health did not say so, that the large suspected leak into the international illicit traffic is confirmed.

The Majlis subsequently passed a bill banning poppy cultivation and non-medical use of opium. However, the coming into force of the bill depends on regulations being made by the Government. In fact, the task of finding alternative means of livelihood for the cultivators of opium, and of rehabilitating the addicts will take many years, and is beyond the administrative resources of the Iranian Government without help. This is the most urgent case for technical assistance in the narcotics field.

The question also arises, if the policy of the Iranian Government is correctly expressed in the Bill adopted by the Majlis, why it does not proceed to ratify the 1953 Opium Protocol, since it is apparently willing to give up its interest as a producing-exporting country, and the provisions of the Protocol for internal application would be in consonance with its new policy.

## TURKEY

The 1953 Opium Protocol requires twenty-five ratifications, including those of three out of seven specified producing-exporting countries and three major manufacturing countries. Fifteen countries have ratified as of 19 January 1956, including three major manufacturing countries and one specified producer-exporter (India). A number of countries which have not yet ratified are holding back until another major producer-exporter - major that is from the commercial point of view - has ratified. This means in effect Turkey, since of the remaining seven producer-exporters specified in the Protocol, the U.S.S.R. did not attend the Opium Conference and is not expected to ratify, the position of Iran as explained above is changing, while the production of Yugoslavia, Bulgaria and Greece is relatively less important commercially.

If and when Turkey ratifies, the remaining signatures to bring the number up to 25, including at least one smaller producer-exporter, would easily be forthcoming.

The key to the 1953 Opium Protocol coming into force in the near future thus rests with Turkey.

Turkey, however, is reluctant to ratify. The Turkish Government dislikes the degree of internal control demanded by the Protocol; and it is rather unlikely to ratify except as a result of more <sup>persuasion</sup> ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ by Turkey's chief customers for (medical) opium (i.e. U.S.A., France and Germany).

Lebanon and Thailand


Both these countries are great transit centres for the illicit traffic in opium and opiates.

In addition, considerable amounts of hashish (cannabis) are produced illicitly in Lebanon, and of opium illicitly in the northern part of Thailand.

After several years of evasive action on the part of these two Governments, the Narcotics Commission in 1955 decided to send an invitation to both of them "urging that an observer, acquainted with and having direct knowledge of, the illicit traffic in the country, should attend the meetings of the Committee on Illicit Traffic and the appropriate meetings of the Commission itself in 1956". These invitations were sent in December 1955.


