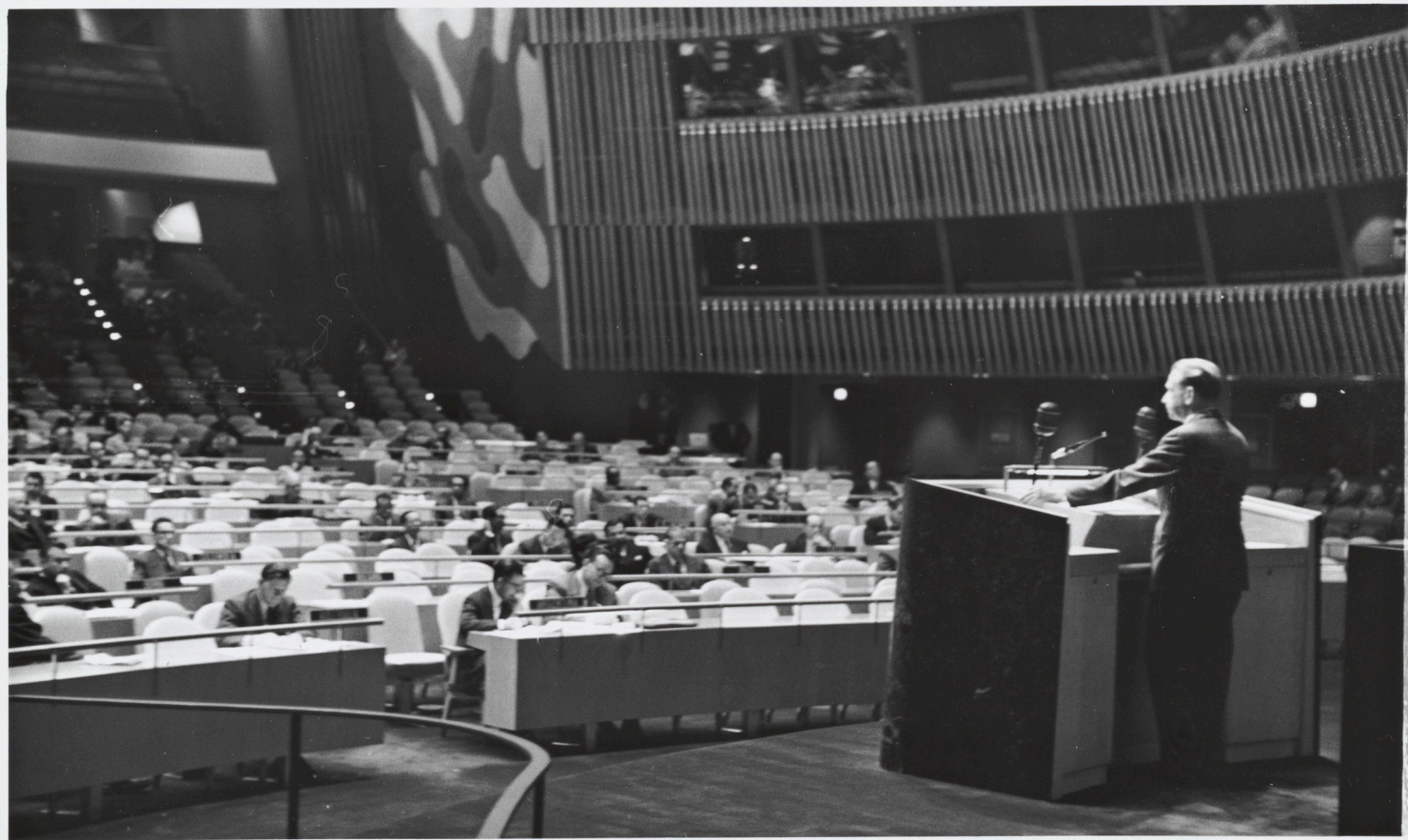

FOURTH TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE CONFERENCE

UN 41860 -- UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., 12 Nov. 1953 --

U.N. Secretary-General Dag HAMMARSKJÖLD addressing the opening meeting of the Fourth Technical Assistance Conference, this morning at U.N. Headquarters.

Extending a welcome to the delegates, Mr. Hammarskjöld said he did not propose to speak about "the present financial position of the Technical Assistance Program," but that he would, instead, discuss its "character." He also expressed gratification that, during the debate in the Assembly's Second Committee, governments had shown such a "high regard" for the Program. Criticism had been voiced but criticism, he felt, was necessary to check errors of judgment and faults of organization when they appeared. However, above all, "one sensed a shared recognition of the growing significance of the program for the world."
