As well as official consultations and functions, these included a 300-mile drive through Australia's highest mountain range, observing projects in the Snowy Mountains scheme for diverting waters for a vast scale hydro-electric and irrigation plan involving the construction of ten dams. He left the Snowy River area by plane for Sydney yesterday morning.

This picture shows Mr. HAMMARSKJOLD taking a photograph of the site of the Adaminaby dam, which is now under construction (Note in the lower left corner the earth-moving machines at work some 400 feet below). The dam will be one of the highest earth and rock fill dams in the world; it will check and store the waters of the Eucumbene River, the Snowy River's largest tributary.

This picture shows Mr. HAMMARSKJOLD (right) and Sir William HUDSON, Commissioner of the Snowy Mountains Hydro-Electric Authority, walking away from the cage which hoisted them back to the surface after inspection of a tunnel being bored nearly 300 feet below. They both wear safety helmets as a protection against possible falls of rocks. The tunnel, which will be some 14 miles in length, is for the diversion of the Eucumbene River from Adaminaby Reservoir to the Tumut River, a tributary of the Murrumbidgee.

U.N. Secretary-General Dag HAMBORSKJOLD is now visiting New Zealand, nearing the end of his six-week tour of the Middle East, Asia and the Pacific, which he started on 15 January. His programme in New Zealand included talks with high Government officials in Wellington, a meeting with the Cabinet, a Government reception at the Parliament House, a press conference, a civic reception at the Town Hall in Auckland, a visit to a Maori village and a climb of Mount Ruapehu, a 9,000 ft. extinct volcano at Chateau Tongariro in the center of the North Island.

UN 48887 - UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., 27 Feb. 1956 -

Secretary-General Dag HAMMARSKJOLD held a press conference today at U.N. Headquarters, following his return on the 24th from a six-week visit to the Middle East, Asia and the Pacific. Discussing the Middle East situation, he said that while he saw no "easy way" to solve problems there, he nevertheless believed "in the possibility of an orderly progress towards solutions".
