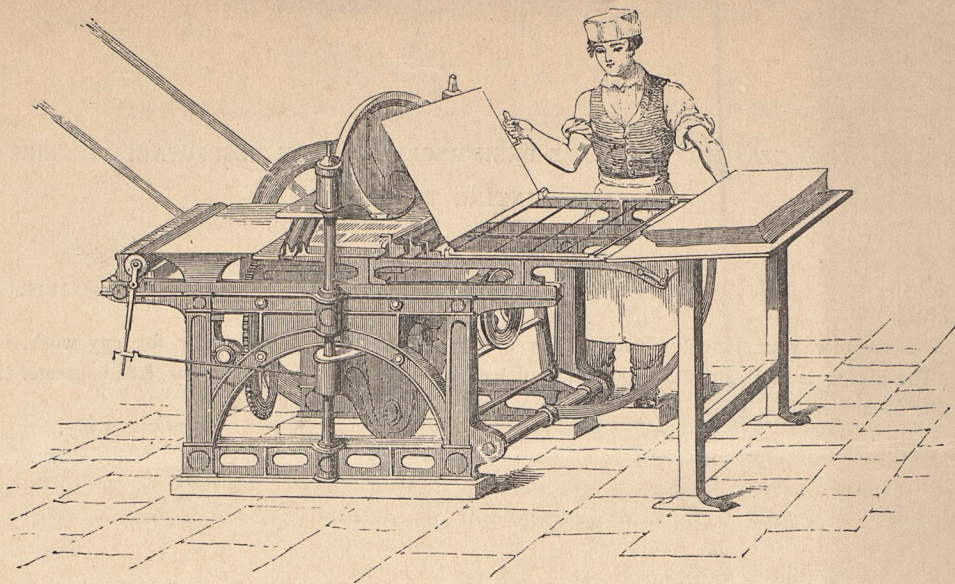

THE SCANDINAVIAN PRINTING PRESS,

INVENTED BY MR. CARL AUGUST HOLM. *from Sweden.*

Mr. I. JAMES begs to announce to the Trade, that with the view of fully carrying out this invention, he has bought from the Patentees the sole right to manufacture and sell the Scandinavian Press, and that he keeps a number always ready for immediate use, with all the improvements suggested by experience from practical men. These improvements are such that this Press can now be recommended to the Trade, as the most complete and useful working machine yet invented.

Where fine work is required, all the means of making ready are the same as at a common hand press, and the facility of getting at the form for alterations, &c., are greater than at any other machine, with the

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small number of moving parts of which the machine is composed, less liable than other presses to get out of order.

The greatest attention has been paid in the getting up of these presses: the bed and plattin are planed to the greatest accuracy, and the whole machine got up in the best style of workmanship by one of the first engineers in the country.

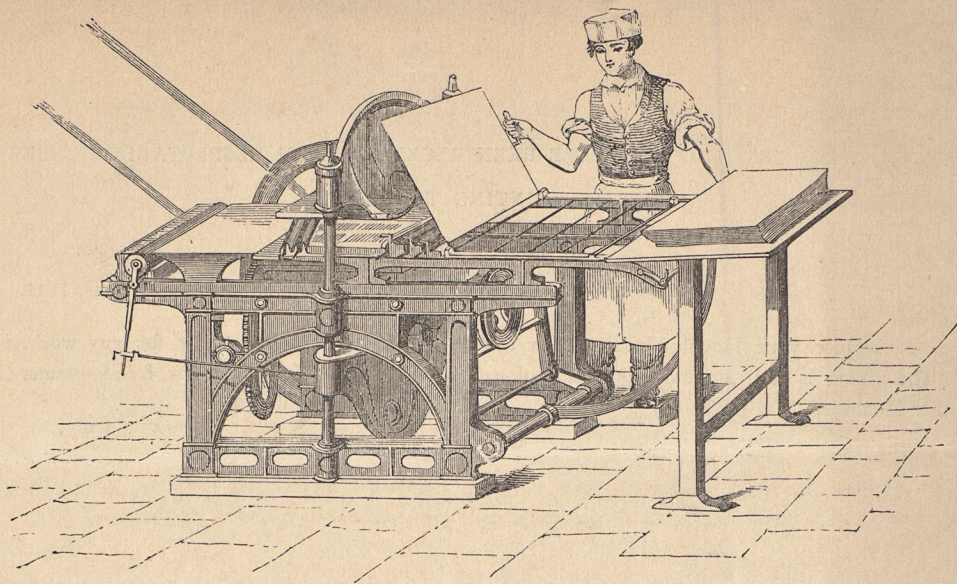
The price of the Scandinavian Printing Press, with one set of inking rolls, working by steam, is £190; and if for working by hand, the necessary apparatus is added for £4 10s.

N.B. When orders are sent it should be stated whether the Presses are to be worked by hand or by steam power.

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Where fine work is required, all the means of making ready are the same as at a common hand press, and the facility of getting at the form for alterations, &c., are greater than at any other machine, with the advantage of being enabled to work the strongest drying ink with the greatest facility: a desideratum which will be appreciated by persons requiring their work to dry quickly, and bear either milling, glazing, or hot pressing, without setting off.

For Wood Cut printing it cannot be excelled, and will be found to afford immense facilities to the printer of illustrated works.

To those requiring despatch with economy in ordinary work, even in short numbers, the Scandinavian Press offers a saving of considerable importance, two boys being capable of throwing off from six to seven hundred impressions per hour.

The Scandinavian Press is extremely simple in its construction, the inking is excellent, and from the small number of moving parts of which the machine is composed, less liable than other presses to get out of order.
